
The youth homelessness crisis is so preventable. There is no reason for it. We should be able to ensure all our young people have a safety net and a way forward.




### GUIDING PRINCIPLES

Every young person who comes to Covenant House is met with unconditional love and absolute respect. These five principles guide our planning, our decision making, and our work with young people:

#### **IMMEDIACY**

We welcome all youth without judgement or conditions; meeting their immediate basic needs of food, clothing, medical attention, and a safe place to sleep, at no cost.



#### **SANCTUARY**

We acknowledge the bravery it takes for young people to walk through our doors. We offer them a welcoming and safe environment based on absolute respect, unconditional love, and relentless support, where we believe in and encourage their resilience.

#### VALUE COMMUNICATION

We value authentic relationships, honor the voice of our youth, and model caring relationships based on trust, respect, and honesty.


#### **STRUCTURE**

We provide stability and consistency for young people to pursue their great promise.

#### CHOICE

We honor that young people hold the power to their story. Through relentless engagement we foster confidence and encourage them to believe in themselves and make informed choices about their lives.











# WHO WE ARE


Millions of young people will experience a form of homelessness in North and Central America this year, either couch surfing, living on the streets... or in some way relying on others for a roof over their heads each night. That means about one in every 10 young people will face homelessness at some point in their lives. And since the first Covenant House doors opened over 50 years ago, we've welcomed more than 1.5 million of them.

But it's more than just a number. These are teenagers and young adults already going through a challenging moment in their lives, a moment fraught with stress, uncertainty, and the desire to fit in. Many are forced to deal with the additional harm of racism, sexism, and homophobia as they begin to embrace their full identities. Now add to the mix the unforgiving stress, stigma, and pain of homelessness, and you have one of the greatest challenges our society faces today: ensuring that every young person has a safe and nourishing place to live and grow into adulthood.

Covenant House began as a single site in New York City and has since expanded to 34 cities across five countries. Each night of 2023, more than 2,200 young people slept in a Covenant House bed, at absolutely no cost to them.








At Covenant House, we know that safe shelter is only the beginning, so we offer every youth wraparound services that include nutritious meals, clothing, and medical and mental health care. As their lives stabilize, our programs journey with them from crisis care to long-term support, so youth can establish and reach their goals through our education, job readiness, and career development programs.

In our transitional living programs, residents live for up to 18 months in semi-independence, while they complete their education and maintain employment. They learn to shop, cook, and clean; manage a savings account, and benefit from professional counseling, vocational training, and the power of living in a loving, supportive community. Our houses include carefully designed spaces to cater to the needs and interests of our youth, from music, to sports, to art.

The goal is that every young person who walks through our doors will ultimately walk out more secure and with the support and opportunities that will help them live stable and fulfilling lives, free of the risk of future homelessness.

# OUR YOUTH, OUR WHY

Young people are significantly more likely to experience homelessness if they are Black, Hispanic, or Indigenous, parenting solo, or are LGBTQ+.




Children raised in poverty and youth lacking a high school diploma or equivalency also are at greater risk of experiencing homelessness. In the U.S. and Canada, almost 20% of our residents have survived human trafficking; in Latin America, about half of our residents, who are just 12 to 18 years old, have experienced some form of trafficking. Our diverse group of young people arrives with varied life experiences, including involvement in foster care and/or the juvenile justice system, victimization in community violence, and struggles with mental health. The majority do not choose homelessness; rather, it is a result of complex factors not tied to a single incident or issue. Covenant House remains accessible 24/7 to all young individuals, offering support without judgment, regardless of race, ethnicity, religion, gender identity or expression, or any other characteristic.







### A New Pathway to Self-Reliance Enters Its Second Year


